Review of Follow-up to the 58th IASC-WG meeting: IASC Follow-Up Matrix

Circulated: 15 November 2004

The findings of the External Review of the Inter-Agency Standing Committee, conducted in December 2003, emphasized the importance of strengthening the monitoring of the follow-up and implementation of decisions taken by the Inter-Agency Standing Committee. In response, this paper aims to provide information of the status of follow-up to the decisions and action points of the  $56^{th}$  (held on 11-12 February 2004 in Rome), the  $57^{th}$  (held 16-17 June 2004 in Geneva) and the  $58^{th}$  (held 22-23 September 2004 in New York) Working Group meetings as well as the ad hoc meeting of the IASC Working Group on Indonesia (held on 18 June 2004 in Geneva). The IASC Working Group is requested to review the status outlined with the aim to collectively identify gaps and opportunities in implementing agreed upon decisions.
