Why: 1) To call on donors to contribute early to Consolidated Appeals

2) To focus international media attention on the 'Humanitarian Appeal 2006'

What: A brief 'ribbon-cutting' event, supported by Web Cast and Op-Eds and B-Roll,

including:

Statement by member of an affected population; Statement by Government of an affected country;

Short IRIN documentary on need and how the CAP makes a difference;

Statement by key donor (either the biggest in absolute terms or biggest as

measured by giving per capita or biggest donor as per GDP); and

Appeal by the Secretary-General.

When: Wednesday 30 November 2005

Where: Nairobi or Geneva Lead: The Secretary-General

Who present: Ambassadors of all Member States and IASC

Outreach in Europe and the Middle East

Why: To enhance support for humanitarian action from the host country

What: Targeted meetings with decision makers, policy makers, civil servants; and
