ERC's Statements to the Security Council on Syria: Aleppo risks becoming a "giant graveyard"

In his 21 November statement to the Security Council, the Emergency Relief Coordinator (ERC), Stephen O'Brien, deplored the ever-worsening situation in Aleppo. "I am more or less at my wits' end as a human being," he said. "Shame on us all for not acting to stop the annihilation of eastern Aleppo and its people and much of the rest of Syria too." Keynote Remarks by the Deputy Secretary-General at the IASC Working Group Meeting

During his keynote remarks at the IASC Working Group meeting on 25 October 2016, Deputy Secretary-General of the UN, Jan Eliasson, drew on his extensive personal experience to analyse the past and current context for humanitarian action. He talked about the initial challenges in achieving GA Resolution 46/182 and highlighted the subsequent evolution of humanitarian response. Reflecting on new trends, he noted an exponential rise in displacement from conflict, natural disasters and climate change, and substantial gaps between needs and financial resourcing. He translated his reflections into conclusions, one of which was that humanitarian action and development must work closer together. Also, he urged them to work in parallel both with prevention and with post conflict-situations. He also pointed to the "the decay and absolute disrespect that we see on humanitarian law and human rights." The full transcript of his key note remarks are available here.

Welcoming the new Special Rapporteur on the human rights of internally displaced persons (IDPs)

Ms. Cecilia Jimenez-Damary was appointed Special Rapporteur on the human rights of IDPs by the Human Rights Council in September 2016 and assumed the mandate on 1 November 2016. She succeeds Dr. Chaloka Beyani, who held the position from 2010 to 2016.

Ms. Jimenez-Damary previously acted as Senior Legal Adviser and Trainer with the Internal Displacement Monitoring Centre (IDMC) of the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) in Geneva; as the National Director of the IDP Project of the Commission on Human Rights of the Philippines; and more recently as the Philippine government representative to the Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Commission on Muslim Mindanao.

Senior Transformative Agenda Implementation Team (STAIT) Mission to Somalia

The Senior Transformative Agenda Implementation Team (STAIT) was invited to carry out a support mission to Somalia in September 2016. The objective was to look at the operational, leadership, and coordination aspects of the response following the El Niño drought and floods. The mission was composed of senior UN and INGO colleagues, which worked closely with the humanitarian community to develop an action plan with the goal of strengthening the response.

The Somalia Humanitarian Country Team (HCT) recognizes the need to function as a cohesive team, led by the Humanitarian Coordinator and guided by a jointly defined vision based on the humanitarian principles. In order to do so, the HCT members are committed to take on leadership responsibilities, to prioritize leadership on protection, accountability to affected people, humanitarian access, cash assistance, and the sustainable return and reintegration of returning refugees. The HCT will also enhance the role of NGOs as strategic and equal partners. There is also recognition that resilience and social protection programming are important in addressing humanitarian concerns, as well as complementing and supporting development objectives.

An update on the implementation of the action plan will be provided in May, 2017. The update will be sent to the Emergency Relief Coordinator and will be shared with the IASC Emergency Directors' Group. Where possible, the STAIT will provide support to implement the action plan.

STAIT webinar on the strategic use of CERF funds

The Senior Transformative Agenda Implementation Team (STAIT) held a webinar on 15 November titled, "The 1 Billion Dollar Question: How can Field Leaders Leverage CERF Funding?" In this webinar, the panellists discussed the practical implications of the Secretary General's call for CERF's annual funding to be increased from \$450 million to \$1 billion by 2018, with a focus on the role of senior humanitarian field leaders in ensuring that CERF funds are allocated to achieve the greatest impact, in meeting urgent needs of people affected by a crisis.

Other areas discussed include, actions taken by the Chad Humanitarian Coordinator to ensure that funds are allocated to prioritised needs based on a crisis-based needs and gap analysis, as well as steps taken by the HC and the HCT to ensure transparency and accountability of the CERF allocation processes. IASC PRIORITIES

IASC Task Team on Accountability to Affected Populations and Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse Meeting

The IASC Task Team on Accountability to Affected Populations and Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse met on 10 November to share an update of the latest achievements in delivering on its workplan and a debriefing of several events and projects around strengthening AAP and PSEA. Mr. Arafat Jamal, the Task Team Sponsor debriefed the group on the actions to advance the work of the IASC AAP PSEA Task Team that were presented during the IASC WG meeting on 25-26 October 2016. The Task Team co-chair Mamadou Ndiaye from OFADEC and other members reiterated on the need to ensure the IASC membership reflect our collective commitment towards localization and facilitate participation of national actors, and the Task Team confirmed its interest in strengthening collaboration with diaspora organizations acting as a bridge with national organizations. Regarding the IASC strategic priority on Accountability and Inclusivity, the Task Team would appreciate an opportunity of exchange between the various IASC Subsidiary Bodies delivering on this priority to ensure synergies and shared understanding. The last meeting of the Task Team for 2016 will be on 8 December, and will focus on PSEA.

IASC Reference Group on Mental Health and Psychosocial Support in Emergency Settings (MHPSS)

The IASC RG Coordinator conducted a mission to Gaziantep, Turkey to support with an MHPSS strategy development workshop for 2017 - 2018. The workshop was cofacilitated by UNHCR's Senior Mental Health Officer from Geneva. The IASC RG Coordinator was also able to support the Northern Syrian MHPSS technical working group (led by WHO), who are also based out of Gaziantep.

The IASC RG Coordinator will conduct a support mission to Athens, Greece in December to provide a 3-day ToT on the IASC MHPSS in Emergency Settings Guidelines for MHPSS working group member agencies. The training will also be followed by a Psychological First Aid ToT.

New educational toolkits launched by IFRC designed to help communities prevent transmission of diseases spread by mosquitoes

Amid spikes in dengue cases and the recent spread of the Zika virus, Red Cross and Red Crescent teams in the Americas, Africa and the Asia Pacific region are rolling out new educational toolkits designed to help communities prevent transmission of diseases spread by infected Aedes mosquitoes. The IFRC, Red Cross Red Crescent Climate Centre in the Netherlands and the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine in the UK joined forces to develop two easily adaptable teaching guides and interactive toolkits to be facilitated by local volunteers and educators — one intended for adults in affected communities and the other for school children. The International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies' (IFRC) new publication 'Unseen Unheard: gender-based violence in disasters. Case studies from Asia Pacific' follows on from the global study 'Unseen Unheard: gender-based violence in disasters' and contains case studies from Bangladesh, Samoa and Myanmar. The case studies provide an overview of gender-based violence within each context, as well as presenting findings and key recommendations with regards to awareness and understanding on GBV occurrence during disasters; availability and access to services; safety and security and livelihoods and migration.

Discrimination and abuse of women aid practitioners in the humanitarian system

The Humanitarian Women's Network has conducted a survey to better understand the issues that women face, working in humanitarian operations. This survey provides a snapshot of the level of discrimination, harassment and abuse faced by women, based on responses received from a total of 1005 women working across more than 70 organizations, providing a strong body of evidence that demands attention.
