Grand Bargain 2.0

Halfway through - what have the EP and Facilitation Group achieved since June 2022, and where are we going?

Achievements





We succeeded: after years of challenges, we now have a model on multi-purpose **cash coordination**, endorsed by the IASC, which is being implemented.

The **role of intermediaries** is more important than ever. The caucus champions are working with the caucus participants to secure concrete outcomes.

The discussion on **quality funding** is now happening at political level - the caucus led by IRC is about to deliver progress on multi-year funding.



We finally have **local and national actors in the driving seat** of the Grand Bargain, through the dedication of a seat for a Global South Signatory in the Facilitation Group and the commitment to establish National Reference Groups.



More than **10 National Reference Groups (NRGs)** are currently being established in crisis settings, thanks to the guidance provided in several languages, developed in consultation, and shared with more than 200 local and national actors.

The Grand Bargain remains a tool to drive **internal change**. The Facilitation Group members individually as Signatories advanced progress on a number of areas, including for example **increased multi-year and flexible funding**, ensured a standard coverage for **flexible indirect support costs** for implementing partners, made greater investments in the **institutional capacity of partners**, etc.



What the EP and Facilitation Group will focus on in the next 12 months

25% funding to **local** and national responders

Overheads and institutional capacity strengthening A new caucus under the leadership of the EP and NEAR will focus on:

Increasing funds (as direct as possible) to local and national responders.



 Reaching an agreement on a common minimum figure for **overhead costs** and strengthen the institutional capacity of local and national responders.



Building on the outcomes of the current caucus on **quality funding**, the EP and Facilitation Group will address remaining issues on quality funding.

Quality funding

Future of the Grand Bargain EP and Facilitation Group will lead a consultation process to collectively determine what should happen to the Grand Bargain 2.0 after June 2023.

A lot still remains to be done: We need Signatories to act individually and collectively



Priority areas that need to be addressed include, for example:

- Participation of affected people
- Risk sharing
- Transparency of data
- Harmonised and simplified reporting
